ANKAMPET IS 170 kilometres away from Hyderabad, a sleepy hamlet in Nizamabad where one would not think of much action, not in the least of an expression as extreme as, "Osama Bin Laden", which was exactly what one found in one of the many rocks surrounding the pristine Asok Sagar.
